The cost for adults playing hide & seek is time spent on a game that isn't helping to develop a new skill. When an adult & child play together though, they share the experience of exploring & being discovered.

Hide & seek is a game played across the world by kids & adults together. When children play it, they are participating in a positive form of play & learning a lot about working together, & about how to overcome the fears of being alone. When adults play, it's more for enjoyment, & not for evolutionary purposes. Hide & seek can be fun for kids & also beneficial to their brain's development.
